In Outré's last season of works at the Pompano Cultural Center, the theater company performed an intriguing — and often controversial — series of shows, including Orwell's "1984," a Green Day rock opera called "American Idiot," a feminist take on Reservoir Dogs called "Reservoir Dolls" and a musical about a transgender rockstar, "Hedwig and the Angry Inch."

In Outré's upcoming production of "The Christians" Outré will explore faith, belief and the seemingly insurmountable distance that separates us.

"This play, while set in a Protestant Christian church, creates a dialogue that transcends religion, and is incredibly poignant at this time in our nation," said Skye Whitcomb, Outré's Artistic Director and the director of the production. "The thing that strikes me most about 'The Christians' is that for all the struggle that the characters go through, there is no 'bad guy.' Every one of these characters is coming from a place of personal truth, of belief, and they struggle with reconciling the differences in their beliefs. There's this heartbreaking distance

between them that tugs at the soul. And one of the most wrenching questions that the play forces us to contemplate is what we should do when those we love believe something that is not only different from what we believe, but believe something that we feel is actually dangerous."

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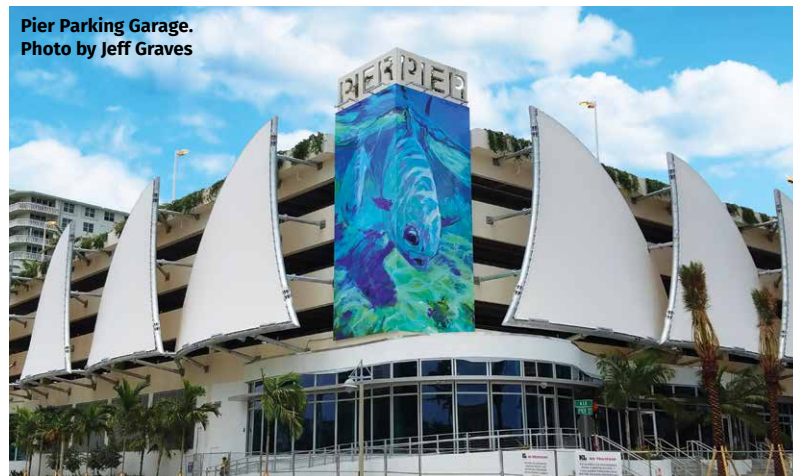
Pompano Explores Naming Rights and Sponsorships as New Revenue Source

In an effort to generate non-property tax revenues to help fund its operations and programs, the City is considering selling naming rights and corporate sponsorships for a number of its assets.

In September, the City Commission approved in a 4-2 vote a contract with The Superlative Group, a national sponsorship analytics and sales firm specialized in working with local governments, to move forward with developing and negotiating sponsorship and naming rights contracts. In addition, the Commission approved a sponsorship policy that Superlative was

- Aquatic Center – \$20,000 - \$40,000

Along with facility signage, naming rights benefits could include the naming sponsor's ID on light pole banners, employee uniforms and information kiosks.



hired last year to help write. The firm was also tasked with preparing a report that included an asset inventory with the estimated revenue each asset could generate.

"It's an innovative area that we wanted to look into," Suzette Sible, assistant city manager, told the Commission.

Sible said the objective is to ultimately reduce the tax burden on residents over time.

Naming rights opportunities were identified for the following venues, along with their potential annual revenues, which, when combined, amount to approximately \$325,000 to \$570,000 per year:

- Pompano Beach Fishing Pier – \$60,000 - \$90,000
- Pier Parking Garage – \$25,000 - \$50,000
- Pompano Beach Cultural Center – \$50,000 - \$75,000
- Pompano Beach Cultural Center Facilities:
- Theater – \$25,000 - \$50,000
- Outdoor Spaces – \$15,000 - \$30,000
- Community Park – \$50,000 - \$75,000
- Community Park Facilities:
- Tennis Center – \$20,000 - \$40,000

In addition to naming rights, Superlative estimates that there is also a potential to generate revenue through category sponsorships, which could include "pouring rights" agreements at the identified city assets and their hosted events, whereby the manufacturer or bottler of a non-alcoholic beverage would be given exclusive permission to control beverage distribution.

Category sponsorships could also be agreements with companies in the areas of telecom, financial services, healthcare, automotive, sporting goods and energy. According to Superlative, \$50,000 to \$500,000 of revenue per year could be generated by each category sponsorship opportunity.

The Pompano Beach Amphitheater was not among the city assets considered for naming rights and other sponsorship opportunities because of an operating

contract with AEG Presents.

If Superlative were to sell all the naming rights and sponsorship opportunities they've identified, the City could net \$600,000 to \$3.5 million per year.

Resident Tom Terwilliger told commissioners the City has spent multiple millions of dollars on building the name recognition of Pompano Beach. "Why do you want to throw it away for pennies? Please, protect the name of the city for the residents."

Sible said it has become more important over the last few years for the City to pursue alternative revenue sources because the Florida Legislature tries on a regular basis to erode some of the City's local revenue sources. For example, a few years back, the Legislature tried to eliminate or reduce the amount of business tax receipts the City could assess. The City receives about \$2 million in business tax receipts a year.

Commissioner Michael Sobel voted against the sponsorship policy that Superlative put forward. He also voted, along with Commissioner Beverly Perkins, against the five-year contract allowing Superlative to solicit contracts with corporate >>>

◀◀ sponsors.

Superlative will be paid a \$7,500 monthly retainer fee for up to 18 months, plus a \$10,000 travel stipend. The Commission will have final approval of any proposed sponsorship contracts.

For any contracts that are approved, the firm will get a 15 percent commission.

“The question is,” said Sobel, “what kind of Pompano Beach do we want in the future? We’re going to permanently market city assets and dictate the products that the residents can consume while attending those assets.”

Sobel said the income that may be generated from it “is negligible, in my view, in terms of the imagery that we’re compromising and the type of city that we will become when we turn these city assets into brand names...It’s not my vision for Pompano Beach.”

“It’s not always about the money,” Sobel added. “This Commission is about to sell our Pompano Beach soul for a diet Pepsi.”

Mayor Lamar Fisher said: “I would not want the public to think that we are ‘selling our soul’ here. We have full control of this particular item, from now until we want to terminate or it’s successful.”

Vice Mayor Charlotte Burrie said that sponsorships are “a great source of income, but just how much City of Pompano Beach identity will we lose?”

Burrie also said she does not think Pompano has the type of buildings that would bring in the amount of money the City is looking for.

“Originally, I was against this,” said Commissioner Rex Hardin, “but I think we ought to go ahead and give ourselves the option. If we can look for outside revenue sources where we reduce the reliance on the taxpayer, that’s what we ought to be doing.”

Under its contract, Superlative is required to provide monthly progress reports which will be shared with the City Commission. If the firm does not perform adequately, or the City wants to go in a different direction, the City can terminate

Pompano Beach Commits To Fostering Local Solar Market

Pompano Beach has made a commitment to become more solar friendly and has been accepted to participate in SolSmart, a U.S. Dept of Energy-funded recognition program for communities that have taken steps to make it faster, easier and more affordable for home and business owners to invest in solar energy.

A designated SolSmart advisor will be working with Pompano Beach to streamline its permitting, planning, zoning and inspection process for home or small business solar installations. By meeting certain criteria, the city can achieve a SolSmart Gold, Silver or Bronze designation. The process could involve making revisions to the city’s code of ordinances.

development, which can help attract them to the community and promote economic growth. The designation also signifies that the city is committed to a cleaner environment and reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

Participation in the SolSmart program was arranged through the South Florida Regional Planning Council. The council reached out to the 71 municipalities in the three counties it serves – Broward, Miami-Dade and Monroe – and received letters of commitment to pursue SolSmart designation from 15 of them, including Pompano.

The project will be getting underway for these cities over the next few weeks, and will last for nine months. About 200

communities across the U.S. have received a SolSmart designation.

According to Gomez, in the past five years, 41 residential properties and two commercial properties in Pompano Beach have installed solar power systems, and 12 residential properties have active permits for the installation of a solar power system. In addition, the Development Services Department has issued permits for 15 solar pool heaters, three solar water heaters, three solar attic fans and one solar camera system.

City facilities featuring solar installations are the parking lot on the northeast corner of A1A and Atlantic Boulevard, and a parking lot behind The Foundry restaurant, which have a total of 18 solar-powered lights and 21 solar-powered, multi-space parking meters.

The City is not only striving to make the process easier for residents and businesses to invest in solar energy, but plans to expand the use of solar installations at its own facilities.



“The City is proud of our expedited permitting program,” said Assistant Development Services Director Jennifer Gomez. “We look forward to identifying any perceived barriers in our codes and finding ways to further facilitate solar installations.”

In addition to benefitting solar customers, the SolSmart designation is meant to send a signal to solar installation companies that the city supports local solar energy
